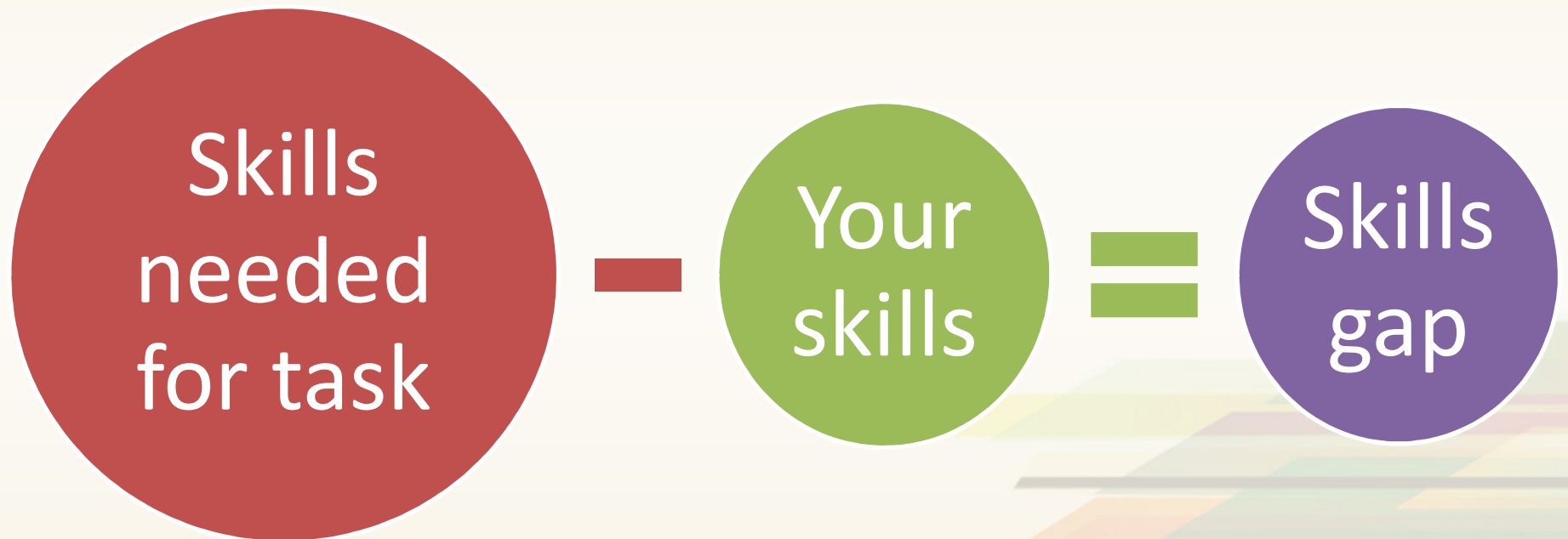

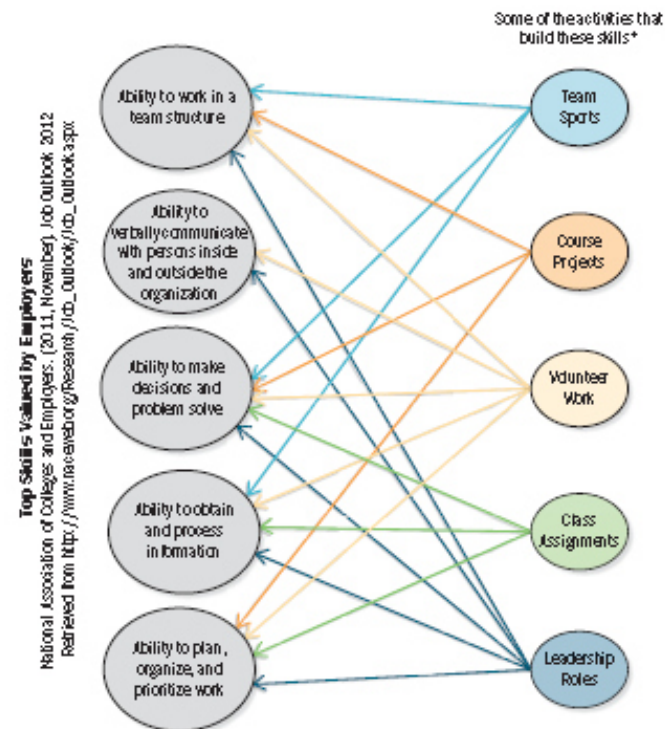
How Important are Transferable Skills?

Information

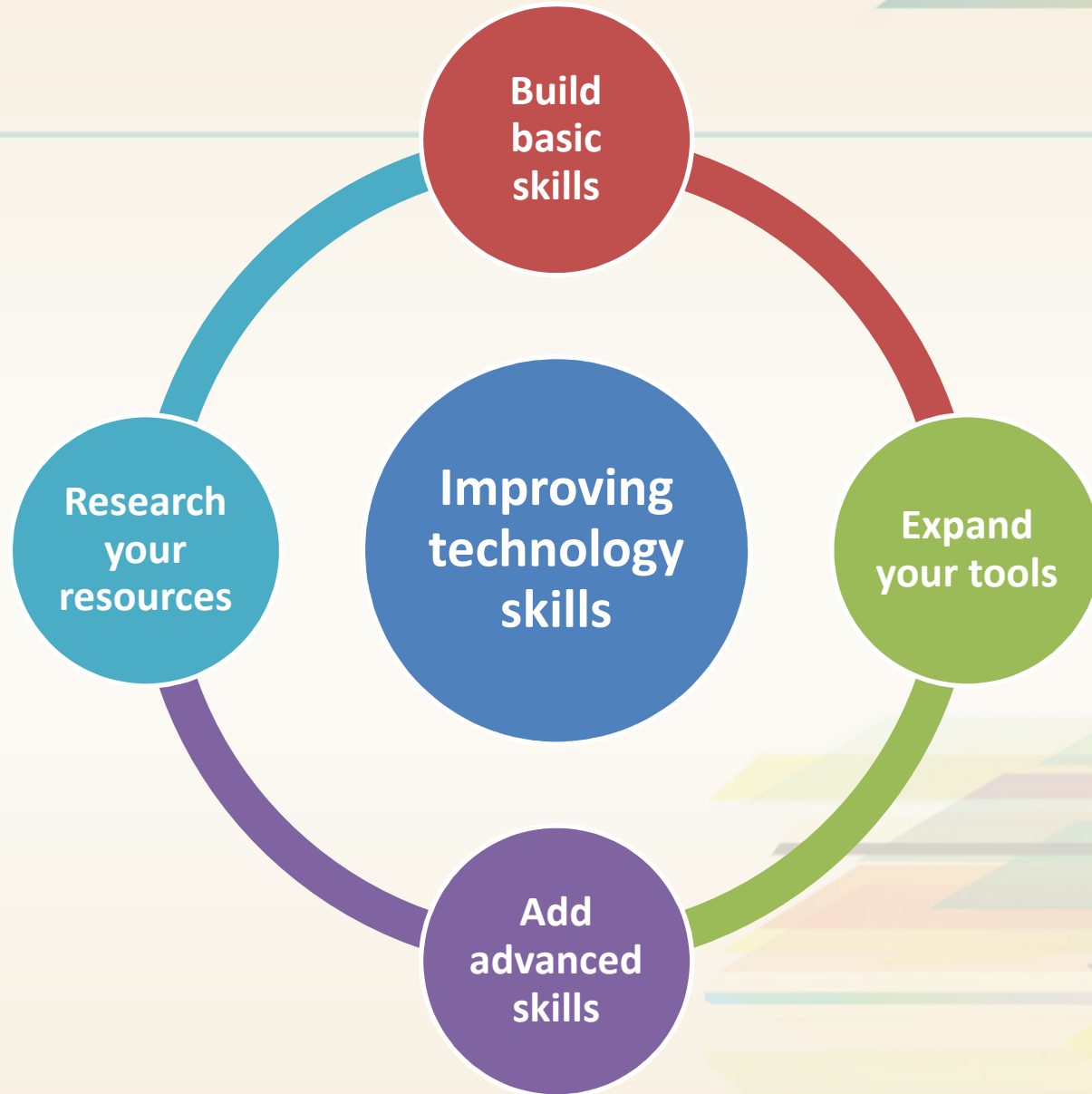
Access and evaluate information while critically and competently evaluating content.

Evidence of Skills

Recognize needed skills

- Assess your skills
- Understand skills needed in potential careers
- Recognize gaps then plan to develop areas

Choose skill-building experiences

- Turn regular job into career-building experience
- Ask to take on added tasks to develop new areas
- Shape your own experiences to build skills

Develop advocates for your skills

- Create meaningful relationships at work and school
- Find a mentor who can guide you
