
The State Executive Branch

- A Weak Executive
- Increasing the Governor's Power
- The Governor's Veto Power
 - Item veto (43 states)

The State Legislature

- Legislative Apportionment
 - Minority Representation
 - Political Gerrymandering
- Term Limits for State Legislators
 - Found in 15 states


The State Legislature

- Judicial Elections and Appointments
 - Elected in 38 states

Local Governments in the United States

Counties	3,303
Municipalities (mainly cities and towns)	19,519
Townships (less extensive powers)	16,360
Special districts (water supply, fire protection, hospitals, libraries, parks and recreation, highways, sewers, and the like)	38,266
School districts	12,880
Total	90,056


Paying for State and Local Government
