Rhetorical Situation For Persuasive Writing

Purpose

 Convince readers to care about an issue and take necessary steps

Audience

Intended readers are people who need to be pressed to act

Topic

- Related to a specific discipline
- Political or social issue
- Humanitarian concern

Qualities of an Appeal to Act

- Compelling and logical argument
 - Describes the issue
 - Convinces readers of the issue's importance
 - Calls for a action
 - Fact-based and reasonable
- Logical argument
 - Based on reliable evidence
 - Avoids logical fallacies
- Mature voice
 - Sounds informed and genuine

Describe a Debatable Issue

- Henry Veldboom
 - Calls upon North American readers to reconsider what they value
 - Title contains issue and central question
 - Introduction talks about North American wealth and its real cost
 - Conclusion states that individual consumers must change if society is to change

Make Clear and Rational Claims, Supported with Reliable Evidence

- Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.
 - Starts with a tragic contrast
 - Uses figurative language to describe the situation
 - Applies an analogy that clarifies the problem
 - Words and phrases are repeated, which creates urgency
 - Addresses specific audiences in turn
 - Provides response to the arguments of the opponents

Make Clear and Rational Claims, Supported with Reliable Evidence

- Utilizes appropriate emotional appeals
- Repeats key phrases, which become a persuasive refrain
- Offers hope, and motivates readers to change society
- Appeals to ideals and humanity's better nature, envisioning a just society
- Concludes by urging the readers to work for a better future

Use an Informed and Mature Voice

- Kofi Annan
 - Urges readers worldwide to help address AIDS and famine in Africa
 - Aims to create urgency about the issue in the title and introduction
 - Outlines the double catastrophe occurring

Use an Informed and Mature Voice

- Contrasts women's situation before and after the onset of the issue
- Emphasizes new combination of necessary and related actions
- Suggests hopeful signs and cases to convince readers about possible change

- Select a topic
 - List issues of interest
 - Pick a related topic that is debatable, significant, current, and manageable
- Choose and analyze the audience
- Minimize the focus and find the purpose

- Generate ideas and support
 - Include opposing viewpoints
 - Investigate the issue
 - Study other calls to action on the same issue
 - Think about the range of actions taken in response
 - Consider desired results

- Organize thinking
 - Make a claim
 - Evaluate the evidence, and develop a line of reasoning
- Write a first draft
 - Opening
 - Development
 - Closing
 - Title

- Improve the ideas, organization, and voice
- Edit and proofread by checking the following issues
 - Words Precise and understandable language
 - Sentence construction
 - Correctness Error-free copy
 - Design Formatted, attractive, and well documented
- Prepare and publish



- Persuading people to do something is challenging
 - Need to change people's minds in order to change their actions
- Writers achieve this goal with sound logic, reliable support, and fitting appeals
