
# **Keyword Searching**

- Helps to find information in:
  - Electronic library catalogs
  - Online databases that index periodical articles
  - Print indexes to periodical publications
  - Internet resources
  - Print books
  - E-books
- Choosing keywords
  - Begin brainstorming a list of possible keywords
  - Consult the Library of Congress subject headings

## **Keyword Search Strategies**

- Get to know the database
- Use a shotgun approach
  - Start with the most likely keyword
  - If there are no results, choose a related term
- Use Boolean operators to refine your search
  - Words or symbols used when searching research databases
  - Describe the relationship between various words or phrases in a search

# **Primary Research Methods**

- Survey/Questionnaire: Set of questions created to gather information from respondents about a specific topic
- Observation: Noting information received in person through the senses
  - Inspection: Purposeful analysis of a site or situation in order to understand it
  - Field research: On-site scientific study conducted for the purpose of attaining raw data

# **Types of Questions**

- Closed
  - Can be answered with a simple fact or with a yes or a no
- Open-ended
  - Require elaborate answers

# **Making the Library Work**

- Librarians Information experts
- Collections: Materials housed within a library
- Research
  - Subscription databases: Online services that, for a fee, provide access to multitude of articles
- Special services Interlibrary loan, hold and reserve services and other options

## **Catalog Searches**

- Locating by Call Numbers
  - Library of Congress call numbers: Set of numbers and letters specifying the subject area, topic, and authorship or title of a book
- Classification Systems
  - LC classification system Combines letters and numbers
  - Dewey decimal system Uses only numbers

## **Research Strategy for Books**

- Check out front and back information
- Scan the table of contents
- Using key words, search the index
- Skim the foreword, preface, or introduction
- Check appendices, glossaries, or bibliographies
- Carefully read appropriate chapters and sections

#### **Forms of Periodical Publications**

- Daily newspapers and newscasts Provide up-to-date information on current events, opinions, and trends
- Weekly and monthly magazines and newscasts - Offer in-depth information on a wide range of topics
- Journals: Quarterly publications providing specialized scholarly information for a narrowly focused audience

  - Basic search
- Making the advanced search
  - Citation lists
    - Refine the search
    - Mark specific citations
    - Re-sort the results
    - Follow links
  - Identifying information
  - Full-text articles

- Subject trees Listing of Web sites, arranged by experts
- Search and metasearch
  - Metasearch tools: Sites that search other search engines
- Understanding the uses and limits of Wikipedia

# **Understanding Wikipedia**

#### **Strengths**

- Consensus model of knowledge
- Currency of information
- Breadth of information
- Links

#### Weaknesses

- Popular model of knowledge
- Anonymity of authorship
- Variable quality of content
- Variable coverage
- Vulnerability to vandalism
- Tertiary nature of information

# **Using Wikipedia**

- Respect the assignment
- Verify Wikipedia information
- Use Wikipedia as a semi-authoritative reference source
- Use Wikipedia as one starting point
- Study individual articles to get a sense of their reliability

- Research is about searching and researching
