
 1820s to the 1840s mountain men roamed the Rocky Mountains




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



 Western settlement complicated matters reaching far beyond the lives of the settlers themselves





- 49th Parallel




Manifest Destiny

- Journalist John O' Sullivan
- Many Americans felt that their country by virtue of its strong Christian faith, its commitment to "civilization" and democracy, and the supposed "emptiness" of the West-would dominate North America as a great **Empire for Liberty**

What else was happening	
1822	A yellow fever epidemic leaves New York City with 16,000 corpses and no readily available space to bury them.
1829	Mexico abolishes slavery.
1835	The Liberty Bell becomes cracked.
1840	The saxophone is invented.
1842	The Treaty of Nanjing ends the First Opium War between Great Britain and China, which began when China protested the importation of opium by British merchants. The treaty mandates that China open trade relations with Great Britain, including the continued trafficking of opium, and it makes Hong Kong a British colony, which it remains until 1997.
1845	The New York Baseball Club plays the Knickerbockers in the first recorded baseball game, at Elysian Fields in Hoboken, New Jersey.
